



A Keeper of His Promises

NOTE: As a guide, use these questions to help with group discussion. Not all questions are needed. Select the ones that will best serve your group as you grow in Christ together through His Word. Soli Deo Gloria.

ICE BREAKER:

Who's someone in your life you trust because they consistently do what they say they'll do?

UNDERSTANDING THE TEXT IN CONTEXT:

What is the nature of David's promise in 1 Samuel 20:14-15 and 1 Samuel 20:42? With both Saul and Jonathan dead, what is unique about the person who remains alive in the line of Jonathan? Read 2 Samuel 4:4.

CONNECTING TO JESUS AND HIS GOSPEL:

The grace Mephibosheth receives is a foreshadowing of the grace we receive from Jesus, the greater son of David (See Matthew 1:1 and Luke 1:32). Together, read and discuss these verses about God's amazing love (1 John 4:10; John 1:12-13; Romans 8:16-17) and the gift of God's extravagant grace (Luke 15:11-32; Ephesians 1:7-8).

LIVING OUT THE TRUTH:

Like David, do you have unfulfilled promises? If so, encourage and pray for one another to be true to your word.

Even more than Mephibosheth, we 'feast' at the table of a greater king: Jesus. Do you recognize that as your identity if you have believed in Jesus? Do you actively see Jesus as not only a savior but also the host welcoming you to fellowship and feasting in His Kingdom? What hinders this? How can you walk in the celebration of that grace? Pray for one another — that grace would grip us and give us greater joy in Jesus. One help: select a text listed above and meditate on it.

PARENTING MOMENT AND FAMILY FOCUS:

Spouses, remind yourselves of your wedding vows — to keep those promises in the joy of the strength of the Lord.

With kids / the whole family, discuss how each of us is like Mephibosheth, invited to the table of King Jesus to feast forevermore.

5. What in this text confuses you?
6. What in this text compels you?
7. Read — and pray along with David — Psalm 51.
